

I am a socio-phonetician and assistant professor of Spanish Linguistics in the department of World Languages and Cultures at the University of Utah. My research focuses on **sound changes** that are motivated by **social factors**. My work brings together detailed acoustic analysis, variationist sociolinguistics, and **speech accommodation methods**, all supported by statistical analyses. The combination of methods that I employ allow me to propose reasons for socio-phonetic variation that consider several motivating factors, including phonetic environment, speaker & listener traits, type and origin of discourse, and lexical frequency of spoken words.
