As Vice Provost for Distance Education, I am responsible for all areas of operations of the University of Arkansas Global Campus and its staff of almost seventy team members. I am, in effect, the chief executive officer of this unit. Global Campus's primary function is to serve as a support unit for the University's for-credit online programming, offered by the colleges, which operates on a quasi-entrepreneurial revenue-share model. Under that model, participating colleges, the University's General Fund, and Global Campus all share net tuition revenue from online programs. Those revenues cover instructional costs, provide an incentive to colleges, contribute to University initiatives, and help to fund Global Campus's in-kind support services (which include market research, instructional design, media production, academic technology, recruiting, communications and marketing, and administrative services) as well as start-up capital that Global Campus provides for new programming. Online programming is a substantial and growing part of the University of Arkansas. In FY 2018, approximately 44% of University students took at least one online course and slightly more than 10% studied in online programs. Enrollments in online programs have increased from 2,747 in 2016 to an estimated 3,100 for 2019. Gross shared online revenues increased from \$22.5 million to an estimated \$27 million during that period. As of spring 2019, the University offered 47 degree, certificate, and specialist programs (7 bachelor's, 20 master's, 2 specialist, 4 doctoral, and 14 certificate programs). In 2018, Global Campus completed a \$4 million renovation project to make more efficient and productive use of office space and to significantly enhance its media production studio and suite. Global Campus also provides non-credit professional and workforce development programming out of its Rogers, Arkansas office. Non-credit programming has increased over the past several years, including through receipt of grants totaling approximately \$1.8 million from the Arkansas Department of

Higher Education to fund the successful IT Readiness program. Finally, Global Campus provides support services to University faculty, students, and staff for learning technology and innovative teaching methods across all delivery modes (face-to-face, online, and hybrid).
