II. TEACHING ACTIVITIES

I believe that teaching is a process where both teacher and student engage and exchange critical information to expand knowledge in a particular discipline or field of study. In addition to that, this information should be a foundation or building block to apply in real-world settings. My teaching activities are purpose driven where the student is tasked to critically think and analyze situations and problems that may arise in a clinical or community health setting. I use writing as a critical thinking exercise and coach through group projects, small group activities and discussions. I strongly believe that this pedagogical approach adopted by John C. Bean (*Engaging Ideas – The Professor’s Guide to Integrating Writing, Critical Thinking, and Active Learning in the Classroom*) and my at the University of Utah and the completion of the CBPR certificate program at KUMC have significantly benefited my students and my process as an instructor.

High School and Undergraduate Teaching/College of Humanities/Department of Communication/University of Utah

Currently, I teach the Comm 5580 (Public Relations, Cases and Campaigns Course). The course is one that I taught at the University of Kansas in 2010-2012 and appreciated teaching this capstone course here at the University of Utah. My goals for this course were to give students a hands-on experience where they would work with actual clients. In the first semester that I taught this course at the University of Utah, we worked with Black Physicians of Utah (BPOU), Girls on the Run Salt Lake and the Make a Wish Foundation. The course was also a CEL or Community Engaged Learning for which we received a small grant award.

In my previous role at the University of Kansas, there was an emphasis on increasing the number of physicians from underrepresented groups requires effective health career pipeline efforts. I served as a co-Investigator for T-SCORE (Teachers and Students for Community-Oriented Research and Education) funded through the National Health Institute since 2015. This program, funded again in 2021, has engaged several area and regional high schools in developing Evidence-Based science courses. In addition to being a Co-Investigator for the grant, I was also a part of the communications development team that manages the external messages about the grant project. In addition, I helped to advise three Center for American Indian Community Health (CAICH) summer interns during the summer and fall of 2016. The end product for each intern was writing three research briefs from existing and current CAICH publications for the CAICH and AIHREA websites.

When I transitioned to KUMC in 2012 I also began mentoring high school students alongside the Post Baccalaureate students. From 2012-2016 I mentored a total of nine high school graduates in the GCRC and Frontiers summer internship program. These teaching experiences have been rewarding and further confirm the necessity to continue this outreach to students in that area and now in Utah. The process of teaching these students includes lecturing and mentoring on various aspects of research over an 8-week period. From this mentorship, more than eight posters were presented for the summer internship program. An additional student served as a project and research assistant on a CDC communications project during the summer of 2015 (Kossivi Esse).

Post Baccalaureate Students

In the summer of 2013, The School of Medicine Office of Diversity and Inclusion approached me with the opportunity to mentor post baccalaureate students within the pre-matriculation program. I mentored four students that summer and introduced them to Community Based Participatory Research principles and processes, community engaged partnerships, public health communication models and community health opportunities. While the outcome was primarily research-focused, I was able to hold informal meetings that turned into mini-lectures on CBPR, health communication and research methodology. These students were able to gain additional knowledge about community health, shadow Family Medicine physicians and conduct vitals and other screenings with individuals through community events (e.g., health fairs). This engagement provided real-world experience and interactions with individuals who exemplify patients that students may encounter in the future. I was subsequently invited again to mentor the post-baccalaureate students in the fall of 2013 but was able to co-mentor the entire cohort of 12 students. During that semester I was able to work with the Office of Diversity and Inclusion (formally known as the Office of Cultural Enhancement and Diversity/OCED) and students about the pre-matriculation process. This experience compelled me to begin discussions about developing a course to formalize this educational opportunity with the post baccalaureate students. Through several conversations with the Department of Family Medicine, Office of Diversity and Inclusion and the KU Edwards campus, we were able to eventually establish a course through the Department of Sociology (Sociology 600). The course evolved and is now offered through Applied Behavioral Science (ABS 469) each spring through our main campus in Lawrence, Kansas. At the end of my teaching at KU Medical we had hoped to expand the course where students would not only have an introduction to the Social Determinants of Health, receive a brief overview about the integration of research into primary care, but that they would also apply research into community settings and practice for an additional semester. Although this wasn’t accomplished, I see that the teaching I will do within the Department of Communication at the University of Utah and mentoring through Huntsman Cancer Institute’s pathway programs will be instrumental in helping students to critically think about the intersection of social and cultural factors in public health communication practices and research.

Clinical/Medical Students

Most recently I co-taught a module at the University of Minnesota's Genetic Counseling program and funded through the National Institutes of Health (R25, GC-FIRST). The module, Community-Engaged research, allowed me to co-instruct two fellows on the basics of community-engaged research and how this may be applied to their clinical practice.

During my time within the School of Medicine, Department of Family Medicine & Community Health Research Division at KU Medical, I mentored five medical students. While I did not begin teaching students within the School of Medicine curriculum, I was able to effectively mentor them through the research process for which they were extremely resourceful and gained critical experience with working with underserved populations concerning colorectal cancer risk and prevention among older African Americans. At the end of my tenure at KU Medical, I actively taught a module within the SOM curriculum once a year.

The following highlights some successes of my work with medical students at KUMC: Dr. Candice Coffey, former medical student and mentee had one conference abstract accepted to the *Society of Teachers in Family Medicine (STFM)* and co-authored the peer-reviewed article: Employing the Church as a Marketer of Cancer Prevention: A Look at a Health Promotion Project Aimed to Reduce Colorectal Cancer among African Americans in the Midwest. The manuscript was published in the *Journal of Family and Community Health*. She is currently a physician in the Department of Internal Medicine at the medical center. Dr. Daniel Nwachokor, mentioned below, now runs his own private practice in Texas and co-authored presentations to the Society of Behavioral Medicine. Dr. Omon Ighalo also is a physician in Texas and volunteered a year with me to gather data with African American churches for an NCI-funded colorectal cancer project. Finally, Mr. Steven Obiefuna, summer intern in 2018, is now matriculating at the University of Missouri- Kansas City School of Medicine. Through the summer internship we talked about his trajectory and opportunities to pursue medicine. He will complete a 6-year medical program in 2023.

Masters and Doctoral Students – University of Utah Department of Communication and Previous Teaching

Within the Department of Communication, I will teach one graduate special topics course on a rotation beginning in 2024 (CommSHER – 7290 - Health Communication and Community Engagement Theory, Methods and Practice). I will also teach a course in the Department of Family and Preventive Medicine (PBHLT 6240- Health Communication). These courses are primarily for doctoral students and will follow a seminar structure.

In my role as a faculty member and researcher at KUMC I had the opportunity to work with two doctoral students from the School of Social Welfare at the University of Kansas-Lawrence campus and the Department of Speech Pathology (KU-Lawrence) and Center for Child Health and Development (CHCD) at KUMC. I also served as a doctoral committee member for Dr. Felicia Mitchell from 2014-2016 who graduated from the School of Social Welfare, KU-Lawrence in 2016. I served as the CBPR methodology expert on Dr. Mitchell's committee and shared my public health communication expertise to help guide her dissertation titled "Water is Life." Dr. Mitchell successfully defended her dissertation and has recently received promotion and tenure as an Associate Professor.

Krista Voelmle, second-year doctoral student with the Department of Speech and Pathology and the Center for Child Health and Development (CHCD) began working with me immediately following a lecture that I gave for Dr. Megha Ramaswamy (PRVM 818) in April of 2017. Krista approached me following the lecture and asked if I would be willing to serve as a mentor and help guide the methodology proposed for her project. Krista and I worked toward investigating the intersection of Speech Pathology, Public Health Communication and how CBPR could help inform her study. She took an independent study course with me (Soc. 900) over the summer of 2017 and worked one additional semester with me.

Master of Public Health Students – University of Utah Department of Communication and Previous Teaching

Here at the University of Utah, I am looking forward to working with a Graduate Assistant (Olivia Webster) for the community-engaged and cancer communication focused work within the Black immigrant and African American communities. I am hoping that this experience will lead to other opportunities to mentor and collaborate with Master's students.

I am continuing to look back and reflect on my experiences with working with students in the Master of Public Health (MPH) program at the University of Kansas. There, I chaired one MPH capstone committee (Dr. Daniel Nwachokor) and served as committee member for four additional students (Charlie Lewis, Ator Ighalo, Mallory Moon and Sarah Wienke) and mentor for doctoral and former MPH student Priya Vanchy. Graduate students working with me have had conference abstracts accepted to the *Kentucky Conference on Health Communication*, *Society of Behavioral Medicine*, and have a peer-reviewed journal publication in *Health Education & Behavior* titled *Marketing a healthy, mind, body, and soul - An analysis of how African American Men View the Church as a Social Marketer* and Health Promoter of Colorectal Cancer Risk and Prevention. I also served as a co-lecturer for PRVM 877, the Health Communication course in the Master of Health Program within the Department of Population Health.

Inter-professional Students

I served as a facilitator for Level I and Level II Inter-professional one-day courses offered campus wide. The aim of the course was to provide a real-world training environment to foster collaborative work between students from varied health care professions. Students were presented with case scenarios to prepare for working in team environments that involve multiple health professionals. Students in the sessions that I co-facilitated were engaged, appreciated the experience, and overall welcomed getting to know students outside of their discipline and to break out of their silos.

KUMC Department of Family Medicine & Community Health Residents

I was also involved with the Department of Family Medicine & Community Health Resident Research Core for 10 years. I led resident research projects and mentored two residents (Drs. Sulabha Chaganaboyana and Omid Ashouri). In addition to mentoring, I led research-specific and intensive lectures with residents to prepare them for their resident research project to be presented in the final year of residency. Finally, I stepped into the Director of Resident Research role in 2018 and served in this position for 2 years.

Community Undergraduate, Post Baccalaureate, Masters and Doctoral Students

Because of the work that I did in the Kansas City Metropolitan area and the type of research that I conduct, students from other area colleges and universities have asked to work with me. I mentored a total of seven students from a collection of higher institutions that include KU-Lawrence (Priya Vanchy), Johnson County Community College (Krista Wamui), Baker University (Crystalee Masarick), K-State (Katelyn Dixon) and Friends University (Rayven Smart). From these mentorships a journal publication, Ronald E. McNair Research Presentation, graduate school applications, and acceptance into the KUMC Master of Public Health Program and KU-Lawrence Applied Behavioral Science Program were yielded.

Community Members of All Ages

As described previously, my teaching expands beyond the classroom and reaches into the community. In addition to teaching high school students and interns during the summer, I was also part of a small group of faculty members who mentored the first cohort of science teachers in the T-SCORE project. Teachers were able to talk to faculty such as myself about health disparities research and how to integrate this into existing science curricula. I have also taught within the community and faith-based settings. In the spring of 2019, my post-baccalaureate students and I secured a Service-Learning grant to deliver colorectal cancer risk and screening education to a senior citizen center in the Kansas City metropolitan area. I also helped plan and co-lead Genetic Counseling and Testing Informational Meetings for African Americans and Latinx who were involved in focus groups. Prior to this, I also assisted the Center for American Indian and Community Health (CAICH) with its health education efforts at its annual Health Pow Wow and other related events from 2015-2019 where I helped to deliver cancer prevention education, delivered a lecture, and assisted with other logistical needs. In 2014 I planned, organized, and facilitated workshops to train community liaisons on how to deliver community lectures about colorectal cancer risk among African Americans. Liaisons were primarily lay leaders from area faith-based organizations, medical personnel within those faith-based organizations, medical students, or researchers. The half-day workshop occurred in September of 2014; I subsequently either co-presented or was the sole presenter for 23 community workshops at 8 faith-based sites throughout the Kansas City Metropolitan area. The community workshops were well received, and part of a research study funded through the National Cancer Institute. In addition to these experiences, I have given presentations at various churches throughout the states of Missouri and Kansas from 2006-2008 and 2016-2017. Some of these community presentations included a health and wellness seminar at Second Missionary Baptist Church in Jefferson City in 2006, health fair presentations in Lawrence, Kansas in 2007 and 2008, and heart health, breast cancer awareness presentations at Kansas City Community Church in 2016 and 2017.

1. Philosophy of Teaching

Briefly describe your philosophy of teaching and how you apply it to different types of learners (e.g., medical students, graduate students, residents, and fellows).

Philosophy of Teaching

My approach to teaching reflects and complements my community-engaged research that I conduct in that I engage my students in real-world situations that require critical thinking and communicating with a diversity of voices through a collaborative and experiential learning experience. As an individual who now teaches in the Humanities and most recently KU Medical Center for 10 years, I employed the process of teaching where I facilitate a community of learners and engage students in service-centered experiences. I have taught a diversity of students and feel that this has broadened my scope and reach as a teacher. The following describes in detail the students I have taught over the course of two decades.

III. SERVICE ACTIVITIES

At the very core of my commitment to this University, my teaching and research discoveries is the spirit of serving others and the advancement of diversity, equity, and inclusion. I have always desired to motivate, encourage, and empower others and I believe that my service activities embody this spirit. This is also exemplified in the community service work that I have done prior to working at the University of Utah. I recognize that our academic campus sits in the heart of a county that has been hardest hit by health disparities and many other societal factors; effective leadership is essential to address these issues. I see myself as an ambassador, servant leader and watch person strategically positioned to move our community forward through effective and efficacious communication and conversations. These are just some of the core beliefs and ideals that I held as a former journalist that have now transcended into my work as a social scientist. Those same principles and the spirit of serving others have compelled and propelled me to engage with community-based organizations (CBO) and faith-based organizations (FBO) across both state lines to improve health equity. As a native of the Kansas City Metropolitan area, it is both challenging and rewarding to work with these organizations through individual events such as health fairs and on-going programs that help build sustainable health outcome (e.g., health ministries and annual partnership health meetings). *Faith Works Connecting for a Healthy Community*, the group that I lead and facilitate, was birthed out of a grant opportunity through my K01 but we never imagined that our passion, engagement, work with FBOs, CBOs and area researchers, students and medical personnel would evolve into the collaboration it is today.

I have also been successful with academic service activities by serving on local, regional, and national committees. I most recently was invited to become a **Center for Scientific Review/Reviewer** within the **National Institutes of Health** (2021). I was also recently named as a Program Liaison for one of Huntsman Cancer Institute's programs (CCPS or Cancer Control and Population Sciences) and team lead for the Society of Behavioral Medicine Cancer Special Interest group DEI lead; I was previously a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Cabinet member and Co-Chair of the Health Equity and Community Engagement Committee in 2020 at KU Medical. Accepting these roles have positioned me to help advance EDI here at the University of Utah. As the past and inaugural chair of the WIMS Diversity Committee at KUMC and being elected as the representative for the Department of Family Medicine in 2013 at the University of Kansas, those roles allowed me to advance conversations and increase efforts to improve academic opportunities for women faculty and students of all backgrounds. These activities also sparked my interest to become active regionally. I joined the Communications Committee for the University of Missouri-Columbia Alumni Magazine in 2016 and served on committees in special interest groups and divisions within the Society of Behavioral Medicine. As mentioned previously, critically writing is a natural extension of my teaching and my research. I was honored to then be invited to serve on the editorial staff of *Health & Ethnicity* as an Associate Editor from 2015-2020 based on my record of research and exemplary record of commitment to advancing health through several forums. The news stories that have been publicized about my work in local (e.g., *Kansas City Call*, *Our Health Matters*, *Lawrence Journal World*), regional (e.g., *KBIA Radio*, *WIBW 13*, Topeka, Kansas) and national media (*John Hansen's Black America*, *Blacks in Higher Education*) is testament to my commitment to not only research and teaching but to the community, region, and the University of Kansas.

IV. RESEARCH AND SCHOLARLY ACTIVITIES:

1. Opening Statement

Provide a brief opening statement to explain the principal areas of scholarly activity and provide your perspective. A description of your most significant contributions to the literature is often helpful to the reviewers.

On July 1, I transitioned to the University of Utah and Huntsman Cancer Institute as a tenured Associate Professor within the Department of Communication and Investigator within the Population Sciences division. I anticipate an active research agenda as I was most recently named a Five for the Fight Fellow and have begun work within the community of Salt Lake City. I am drawing from work that began on September 1, 2012 when I moved from the School of Journalism and Mass Communications at the Lawrence, Kansas campus to an Assistant Professor position within the Department of Family Medicine & Community Health Research Division at the School of Medicine. At that time, I was also given a courtesy appointment within the School of Journalism and Mass Communications for which was a position until I left in June of 2022. The research that I conducted focused on cancer communication scholarship with under-represented communities of colors. These positions within my present and former institution have led to promotion and tenure as an Associate Professor and have also given me the opportunity to leverage my research interests and acumen in a way that is innovative, cross-cutting across multiple disciplines. The scholarship that I have conducted has also positioned me as a future national leading public health communication and community-based participatory researcher addressing cancer health disparities.

Prior to my tenure at KUMC I envisioned building a strong research trajectory and subsequently secured internal faculty grants to support breast cancer communication research. I also began volunteering with Dr. K. Allen Greiner and the Family Medicine Research Division team and later received an NCI Minority Supplement to support colorectal (CRC) cancer screening communication research in 2009. In addition, during that same year I was awarded a BIRCWH grant with Dr. Patricia A. Thomas to support breast cancer health promotion research. After several discussions with Drs. Thomas and Greiner and other KUMC and KU-Lawrence scholars, I decided that accepting the National Institute of Health mechanism would be the best research trajectory for my academic career because: 1) I was prohibited from accepting two federal training grants and would not be able to accept the BIRCWH grant concurrently with the Minority Supplement, 2) acceptance of the Minority Supplement grant would help to build external research opportunities and internal collaborations at the KUMC campus, 3) it would lay a strong foundation to apply for a future career development award (K01) and 4) it would provide protected time to acquire additional health-related knowledge and skills through the MPH program at KUMC. The rationale for accepting the Minority Supplement proved well as I was awarded a K01 through the National Cancer Institute in 2011 and it has laid an important step to build a track record of NIH and other external funding to support my public health/cancer communication and health disparities research. In addition, I have also been able to publish work that is colorectal and breast cancer related. This decision has afforded me the opportunity to conduct transdisciplinary research within and alongside underserved communities and to contribute important work within the KUMC School of Medicine. As a faculty member and now Associate Professor at the University of Utah, Department of Communication and Huntsman Cancer Institute, I believe my expertise as a public health communication and health disparities scholar will serve the University, College of Humanities and Department well in that I have significantly contributed to how we view and subsequently treat the patient. I have been able to integrate this type of scholarship within my previous department through my teaching and service within the community. These are evidenced through the scholarship published in journals targeting public health professionals and scholars, medical personnel and scholars, health communication professionals and scholars, social scientists, psychologists, and sociologists. It is also evidenced through the completion of my CBPR certificate, and the products yielded from this educational process.

Research interests and focus:

As an African American woman, health communications researcher and individual who has witnessed family members die or suffer from cancer and other health disparities, I feel it is my purpose and moral obligation to address these issues. I also believe that it is my calling to take my experiences, expertise as a scholar and relationships with community, medical and research partners to act experimentally and spur change through innovative and engaged research. Finding cures to cancer, treating patients for illness, or explaining why getting screened for CRC are critical to the patient's wellbeing. Unfortunately, gaps occur in the communication pathway to clearly inform, educate, or persuade an individual or the masses about pertinent health issues that impede positive health outcome. Addressing health communication inequity and inequality on multiple societal levels requires not only the expertise of the researcher but also the community for which holds the answer to fighting insidious diseases and health issues. The following areas below are the overarching foci for the transdisciplinary research that I conduct.

Public Health Cancer Communication: In the research I conduct, I aim to continue a research stream and trajectory that reduces cancer health disparities among underserved and underrepresented populations. Through this type of scholarship, identification, and examination of efficacious and effective communication factors on multiple levels and platforms is possible. These include primary care communication (doctor/patient communication), public health communication (social marketing, health literacy, cultural literacy, cross-cultural health care communication, health education, health promotion through technology and social networks), cultural competency, and social and behavioral psychology. It has been my goal to continue novel research that informs health communication research for the greater good of society and one that pushes communication to the core of primary care and public health.

Cultural Factors: I currently manage or am Co-Investigator on engagement and/or research and education grants that investigate the impact of societal factors (e.g., SDoH), spirituality, religion, race and cultural norms among African Americans, Native Americans, and Latinos. These factors are important and central to the patient's worldview and can significantly impede or facilitate health outcome.

Psychological and Sociological Factors: The impact that psycho-socio factors have on certain segments of the population may have deleterious or positive effects. These factors often positively or negatively correlate with the Social Determinants of Health (SDoH) that can span from built environment to health literacy and educational attainment. Other psycho-socio factors include self-efficacy, perceptions, opinions, and beliefs that individuals from underrepresented groups have about health behavior and health outcome. It is the astute health communications professional and scholar that investigates not only the direct paths of health communication and the psychological and sociological factors that influence those processes but also the variables that may mediate or hinder this relationship indirectly.

Community-based Participatory Research: I follow a research approach that is grounded in CBPR or community-based participatory research and principles that allow me to conduct transdisciplinary research that involves multiple communities (researchers, academics, medical personnel, faith-based organizations, community-based organizations). This type of methodology also allows me to triangulate data through both qualitative and quantitative methods to best answer the research questions posed by all communities collectively.
